Not long ago, life for Brendan H. Banks and Kelly Shea meant subways, taxis, and the punishing pace of New York City. Kelly had worked on global ad campaigns for Ralph Lauren before launching a freelance career as a prop stylist, set designer, and lifestyle writer.
