Although tropical rainforests only cover about four percent of the earth's land area, more than half of all known animal and plant species are at home here. And rainforests have not been fully explored for a long time.



This line represents the equator. The equator is an imaginary line that splits the Earth in two—the Northern and the Southern hemispheres. It is very warm there—the perfect conditions for rainforests.
