

BRUCE REYNOLDS Of London (1931-2013)

Reynolds's early childhood was marked by very regular family conflict, and once he reached adolescence, he often got into fights.

Bruce spent his youth roaming the suburbs of the British

capital, plotting and thieving, always trying to make it big until, inevitably, he ended up in jail.

IN DURHAM PRISON

While Reynolds was in jail, his cellmate told him a secret that would change his life forever. He disclosed to Reynolds the

details of a special Royal Mail train that regularly transported sacks full of money from Glasgow's banks to the capital in the middle of the night.

That was the opportunity Reynolds had been waiting for, and from that moment on, he spent the rest of his jail time planning in detail the robbery of the loaded Royal Mail train.
