


## KAFKA'S CASTLE

A black slate sanctuary nestles on an Andorran mountainside, a case study in the relationship between architecture and nature, and the perfect setting for meditation and withdrawal.





## 77 WEST WACKER DRIVE

#### 1992 Chicago/United States

With his first commission to design a skyscraper in the United States, Bofill sought to capture the essence of early speculative North American designs.





1989 Metz/France

This renovation of a nineteenth-century military warehouse allowed for a fresh take on architecture as stage setting, with a bold and original use of space.

#### LES ARCADES & LES TEMPLES DU LAC

1982 & 1986 St.-Quentin-En-Yvelines/France

In a scheme that architectural critics have dubbed a "Versailles for the masses," Bofill draws on classical themes to create low-cost housing in France.
