Pretty in Pink with a Monochrome Edge





When resourceful Swedish couple Pär and Lovisa started planning their new kitchen, it was the Smeg fridge that set the color scheme. They had never intended to go for pink, but once the fridge was in, it seemed like the obvious choice. The couple live in a 1930s apartment in Malmö with their children, Ebbe and Iris, and wanted a design that referenced the 1940s and 50s, and a pastel scheme that felt contemporary. The kitchen itself was found on the

internet—free, if disassembled.
Luckily, Pär is a carpenter
so he knows a thing or two about
DIY. After installing the frame,
they replaced the doors and found
the vintage cabinet handles
at a building preservation store. Pär
molded the concrete countertop
himself and used dark grout between
the tiles to give the pink scheme
a bit of an edge. A quirky picture by
illustrator Anna Sonesson and
fun festoon lighting emphasize the
black-and-white backdrop.
